Ministry & The Work of God: 13

True Ministry Points People To Jesus

Nehemiah 9-10

In these chapters we read that the people of God who had been involved in and/or watched the reconstruction of the wall make a re-commitment to God

In chapter 9 they confess their sin and remember His dealings with them:

- Confess their sin (9. 1-3)
- Remember His dealings with them & give thanks (9. 5-37)

Chapter 10 outlines the people's re-commitment to God's covenant. They renew their covenant with God to:

- Walk in God's Law (29)
- Keep marriage amongst God's people (30)
- Honour the Sabbath Day (31)
- Exact an annual Temple Tax For the service of the House of God (32)

[see Matthew 17.24-27]

- Bring gifts for the offerings (34)
- Bring their tithes into the storehouse (35-39)

In Lesson 9 we made the following points:

- The work of God is not to be used for profiteering, or making money for personal gain.
- We do not take advantage of other people's situations or misfortunes to further our own lifestyles or ministries.
- The work of God is to minister to (serve) people not take from them, or to build empires or our own reputation it is God's work not ours!

The main purpose of ministry is to point men and women to Jesus.

- Nehemiah's ministry was not just about rebuilding the walls
- It was to bring the people, who had gone astray from God, back to Him.

John 15.26-27

- part of the ministry of the Holy Spirit is to point men and women to Jesus, and to convict them of sin, righteousness and judgement (John 16. 8-11)
- If our ministry carries the anointing of the Holy Spirit then it can only point to Jesus.

John 1.20-23, 29, 35-37; John 3.27-36

- John the Baptist was 'the voice of one crying in the wilderness' preparing the way for Jesus.
- His ministry was to point men to Jesus 'Behold the Lamb of God'

John was not interested in building a kingdom for himself but fulfilling that ministry
- 'He must increase, I must decrease'

Acts 8.35

Philip <u>preached Jesus</u> to the Ethiopian eunuch – not a ministry.

1 Corinthians 1.22-23

- Jews and Greeks sought after different things Jews wanted to see signs and miracles, the Greeks wanted to learn wisdom and fill their intellect.
- There were contentions in the church at Corinth (v11-13) some were hanging on to labels – Paul, Apollos, Cephas (as many do today ministry or denominational labels)
- · Paul said 'but we preach Christ crucified'

2 Corinthians 4.5

- We do not preach ourselves but Christ Jesus the Lord
- Paul did not proclaim anything other than Jesus Jesus the Saviour, Healer, Baptizer

Acts 4.8-14

- Peter & John proclaimed Jesus
- There is salvation in no other name

But they were preachers! What about me?

Acts 8.1,4

 The scattered believers went everywhere preaching the word – the good news that peace, pardon, righteousness and salvation is in <u>Jesus</u> - sharing their testimony

Matthew 5.14-16

- You are a light in a dark world
- Let your light shine let Jesus be seen in you

2 Timothy 4.5

• Whatever our ministry, eg administrative or helps, we must fulfill the work and do the work of an evangelist (pointing men to Jesus)

John 6.37,44

The Father draws men and women to Jesus

Lessons:

1. Be careful to proclaim Jesus to the world and not the work or programmes of ministry
